

Guide for authors

Contributions are welcome on all aspects of human and physical geography interpreted in the very broadest sense. The upper word limit is *c.* 10,000 words. Contributions will be peer-reviewed by the Editor and at least one specialist in the field. Papers will be either accepted, rejected, or accepted subject to modification in the light of reviewers comments. Manuscripts should be word-processed and submitted electronically (e.g. via email) to the Editor (Dr Rebecca Schaaf, Dept. of Geography, Bath Spa University College, Newton Park, Bath, BA2 9BN, UK; email: r.schaaf@bathspa.ac.uk). Upon acceptance, authors should provide good quality electronic copies of the manuscript, figures, tables and photographs, preferably using common software, such as WORD, Excel, *etc.*, and saving images as BitMap, TIFF, or JPEG files.

The format of submitted manuscripts should be as follows:

1. Title
2. Name of author(s)
3. Affiliation of the author(s)
4. Abstract (up to 500 words)
5. Up to 8 Index (Key) Words
6. Main body of text, subdivided into un-numbered **MAIN HEADINGS**, **Secondary Headings**, and *Tertiary Headings*.
7. Any **ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS**.
8. **REFERENCES** to all sources (cited in the text as *e.g.*, Curran 1980; Carter 1982; Graham and Read 1986; Aplin *et al.* 1997) in the following format:

Reprints. An electronic copy (PDF file) is supplied which the author(s) may distribute as a reprint. Bath Spa University claim copyright of published papers, but the first named author (alone) is entitled to make copies of their paper for free distribution.
